Prince Albert National Park reserves the right to revoke this permit should the outlined conditions not be met and or temporarily suspended for public safety reasons ie. Fire bans issued by the Superintendent.

A Site Plan of the lot includes: location and dimensions of ALL structures, including sheds and decks, driveway area, propane tanks and location of trees within the area of the proposed fire container.

- A \$5.00 permit fee is required.

**PARK DIRECTIVE
FIRE POLICY FOR ALL OPEN FIRES
PRINCE ALBERT NATION PARK OF CANADA**

This directive will be for the town site of Waskesiu Lake within Prince Albert National Park of Canada. This directive shall supersede any previous Park Directives on open fires.

This directive shall not supersede any National Parks Acts or Regulations but shall be used in conjunction with the National Parks Act and Regulations.

1. Definitions for this Directive:

- a. Waskesiu Town Site includes:
 - (a) Seasonal Residential Areas - Lakeview Subdivisions One, Two and Three; Prospect Point Ranges One, Two and Three; Seasonal Staff Trailer Park;
 - (b) Staff Accommodations - Elk and Montreal;
 - (c) Campgrounds - Beaver Glen and Trailer Park;
 - (d) Commercial Core - Staff accommodations on commercial properties;
 - (e) Bungalow Camps - Armstrong Hillcrest Cabins and Motel, Bakers Bungalows, Kapasiwin Bungalows and Lost Creek Resort.
 - (f) Excludes Seasonal Cabin Area

- b. Open Fires
 - (a) All wood fires enclosed in a fire pit with a cover
 - (b) All wood fires enclosed in a metal casing

2. National Parks Fire Protection Regulation state:

- 4.(1) No Person shall start or maintain any fire in a park except
 - (a) in a fireplace on private property;
 - (b) in a fireplace provided by the superintendent;
 - (c) in a portable stove, hibachi or barbecue; or
 - (d) when in possession of a permit issued under subsection (3).

- (3) The Superintendent may issue a permit to a person to start and maintain a fire in a park and such permit shall be subject to any terms and conditions stated thereon by the Superintendent.

3. Park Directive for Fires

All open fires will require a permit as per Section 4(3) of the National Park Fire Protection Regulations.

4. Information Required and Conditions for the Issuance of a Fire Permit

- a. Site Plan - clearly identifying address, clearances between all structures, (including sheds and decks, propane tanks and trees) and location of the proposed or existing open fire container.

Setbacks -- not less than 1.8 m (6.0 ft) from all buildings and structures;
– 0.9 m (3.0 ft) from where side property line has been determined;
– safe distance from any fire hazard ie. trees, dry grass etc.

- b. The fire pit is to be placed in a fixed location, that has had appropriate site preparation, and is clearly indicated on the site plan.
- c. A description of the proposed or existing open fire container. All open fire containers will be inspected by the Townsite clerk, a park warden, park manager or designate.
- d. All fire pits are to be built as an enclosed unit and have approved grating to cover the entire top of the pit in order to limit the size of the fire as well as control sparks/embers created by the fire.

Prince Albert National Park of Canada reserves the right to revoke or temporarily suspend this permit should the outlined conditions previously met are altered after issuance of the fire permit for public safety reasons, ie. Fire ban issued by the Superintendent.
